Project scope:

Review of the RTALSG and associated Lakes Programme Prepared by Nicki Douglas, Te Arawa Lakes Trust,

This document outlines the proposed scope of an upcoming review of the Terms of reference of the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes Strategy Group (RTALSG) and the Lakes Restoration Programme.

1. Our understanding of the Project

The Te Arawa Lakes Settlement Act 2006 established the RTALSG, a permanent joint committee of TALT, Bay of Plenty Regional Council (BOPRC) and Rotorua Lakes Council (RLC).

The Group's purpose, taken directly from the Settlement Act, is

To contribute to the promotion of the sustainable management of the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes and their catchments, for the use and enjoyment of present and future generations, while recognising and providing for the traditional relationship of Te Arawa with their ancestral lakes.

In June 2022, the RTALSG moved that a strategic review of the current Terms of



reference and the Lakes Restoration Programme is undertaken¹. The role of Te Arawa Lakes Trust is to lead the review, on behalf of RTALSG.

¹ TALT to prepare a report to the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes Strategy Group hui scheduled for 30 September 2022 on the scope for the review of the strategy programme/strategy group (with the inclusion of an independent/objective overview as part of the process).

This resolution was made because of a recommendation from the triennial audit of the Programme² -

• *Review the governance arrangements and confirm the roles and responsibilities of the Strategy Group.*

Include all lakes initiatives in programme reporting for strategy group oversight.Review the remaining delivery path.

- Set up an independent panel to review the programme and any delivery or funding gaps.
- *Review and refresh the TLI Targets. Determine any changes to targets based on proposed changes to the NPS-FM.*

In September 2022, RTALSG members provided guidance as to the potential scope of the review.

2. Project outcomes

The intended outcomes of the review are as follows:

The Strategy Group governance scope and oversight arrangements enables strategic decision making for the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes Programme and mandates the leadership of the Group to determine and implement the agreed Vision and the Delivery Strategy for the Te Arawa Rotorua Lakes. The agreed Strategic objectives and Programme include all the Rotorua Te Arawa Lakes within the Catchment and of the areas of responsibility of the partner Councils.

This review will help to ensure that the RTALSG is operating effectively in determining and setting shared goals and in monitoring the effectiveness of agreed interventions and programmes and all related efforts by targeting the protection and restoration of the health of the Te Arawa Lakes.

3. Proposed approach

Our proposed approach involves three distinct stages, which are outlined further below.

- 230 hectares of land use change completed.
- Outlet structure and pipeline upgraded and operational.
- Continued support of Landcare Ökāreka work for environmental restoration - now teaming up with TALT.



Lake Rotoehu

- Re-consenting (including optimised dosing methodology) being worked through for alum dosing on this lake. i.e. Cultural Impact Assessment and peer review.
- Rotoehu main trunk sewer installation completed. Further funding required for onsite connections to complete project.
- Phosphorous locking currently turned off due to extremely high lake levels.
- Weed harvesting unlikely this season due to spread of weed following Cyclone Gabrielle and difficulty of unloading weed due to extremely high lake level.

Resolving **On track** issues

KEY - Water quality status Poor



- Advice and Support: 309 properties have used Service. 8 of these properties are over 40ha and there are 12 who have yet to be consented (or deemed permitted). These properties will shortly receive their final notice to comply, prior to compliance action. There are approximately 10 remaining properties under 40ha in the catchment to engage in the service, staff are working through this list.
- Low Nitrogen Land Use Fund: Irrigation scheduling equipment has been installed at the hazelnut trial site, preparations have commenced for harvesting the Hamurana mānuka trial site.
- Constructed Wetlands Project: Rural drain wetland pilot project site secured and design underway - construction likely to commence 2023/2024. Work underway to secure further restoration site.
- Incentives Scheme: To date 31 deals have been finalised which has removed 34.2 tN/yr from Lake Rotorua and resulted in almost 4500 ha of land use change.
- Deed funded gorse and sewerage reticulation projects complete.
- Lake Rotorua Science Review: Review completed, summary report available shortly - will be presented to Strategy Group.
- Alum tanks have been replaced at Utuhina phosphorous locking plant, some upgrades planned to Puarenga plant.
- Current algae bloom on Lake Rotorua and Ohau Channel. alum plants operating at full consented capacity.
- 159 ha of land use change, 40 ha of wetland restoration and 124 ha of Significant Natural Area Restoration undertaken in the Rotorua catchment (2017-2022).

- Phase One (mains and pump stations) construction of Tarawera Sewerage Scheme to commence beginning of April 2023, Fulton Hogan as contractor.
- Te Mana o Te Wai funding for three years secured for Collective Impact Project to be led by Te Arawa Lakes Trust. Team now in
- Ökaro alum dosing scheduled early March.
- Late April working bee planned at Tarawera to undertake Acacia seedling control and assess next steps with project.


